INTRODUCTION

ABOUT THIS REPORT

The Workforce Intelligence Network for Southeast Michigan (WIN) partnership is a collaboration of Michigan Works! Agencies (MWAs) and community colleges across a 19-county region in Michigan. The counties in the WIN partnership include Clinton, Eaton, Genesee, Hillsdale, Huron, Ingham, Jackson, Lapeer, Lenawee, Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Oakland, St. Clair, Sanilac, Shiawassee, Tuscola, Washtenaw, and Wayne, along with the City of Detroit.

The WIN data and research team analyzes job posting data at the occupation level within 11 customized occupation groups built using specific Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) codes to provide more contextualized information. Occupation groups combine data for jobs with similar skillsets, educational attainment, and experience requirements, which provides a more in-depth snapshot of the current labor market when compared to traditional industry data based upon North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) codes. Occupation outlook sections utilize these metrics to identify and display the top in-demand jobs, entry-level requirements, and earning potential.

WIN produces a quarterly 19-county region report using data from all eleven occupation groups. A report focused on the city of Detroit is also produced quarterly, focusing on five occupation groups related to the Detroit labor market. County reports are produced annually and focus on five occupation groups chosen to reflect the labor market specific to the county.

This report highlights labor market information and real-time job posting data for the WIN Region, including a workforce overview that identifies key components of the area's labor market such as labor force status and demographic and commuting data. The WIN analysis of online job postings, a proxy for employer demand, is a pioneering method for tracking the labor market's health. This data is used to provide real-time demand and job posting information for both employers and job seekers. This report analyzes the fourth quarter of 2024 labor market information from the WIN Region for all 11 occupation groups.



Annual State of the Labor Market

During the fourth quarter of 2024, the labor force and employment figures declined, while unemployment improved from Q3 2024 in southeast Michigan. The number of unemployed workers decreased by 2.7 percent, the size of the labor force decreased by 1.1 percent and the number of employed individuals decreased by 1.0 percent. These changes demonstrate COVID-19 recovery tapering off and more traditional economic trends prevailing.


Annual Labor Market Information

The labor force in southeast Michigan improved between 2023 and 2024 YTD, gaining 45,846 individuals, or 1.5 percent. Employment tracked less proportionately to the labor force, reporting an increase of 0.7 percent, or 21,620 more workers in 2024. The unemployment rate increased during the same period to a rate of 4.5 percent.



Quarterly Employer Demand Overview

Data from the fourth guarter of 2024, showed a decrease in demand levels in southeast Michigan, down 9,948 postings or 6.9 percent since Q3 2024. Over the past year, postings have increased by 8,338 compared with Q4 2024, up 6.7 percent.

During Q4 2024, there were 242,924 unique job postings, 20,330 (7.7 percent) less than the 263,254 postings made during Q3 2024 in the 19-county WIN region. All occupation groups saw a decrease in postings this quarter. The Customer Service occupation group had the greatest demand with 60,310 unique postings. The top posted job titles include Registered Nurses, Retail Salespersons, Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers, First-Line Supervisors of Retail Sales Workers, and Software Developers. For more


Of the 242,924 unique postings in the WIN Region during Q4 2024, 66,678 (27.4 percent) required a Bachelor's degree, while 62,012 postings (25.5 percent) required a High School diploma or equivalent. An additional 25,571 postings (10.5 percent) required an advanced degree.

In-Demand Education Levels



The latest quarterly labor market data from southeast Michigan highlighted a decline in the labor force and employment. During Q4 2024, labor force figures were 1.1 percent lower (34,932 individuals) and employment was 1.0 percent lower (30,646 individuals) than in Q3 2024. The unemployment rate decreased to 4.8 percent in Q4 2024, a 0.1 percentage point decrease from Q3 2024. The labor force decreased by 1.0 percent from Q4 2023 while employment figures showed annual decline of 2.1 percent during the same period. LABOR FORCE, EMPLOYMENT, AND UNEMPLOYMENT

Through the fourth quarter of 2024, the labor force in southeast Michigan experienced growth. The labor force is up by 45,846 individuals (1.5 percent) since 2023, while employment in the 19-county area increased by 21,620 workers (0.7 percent). Unemployment increased by 24,225 individuals from 2023. The unemployment rate demonstrated a commensurate increase, for a 2024 unemployment rate of 4.5 percent.

CENSUS 2023 LABOR FORCE DEMOGRAPHICS

During the most recent census year (2023) there were about 3.156.821 people in the labor force, either working or seeking employment in the 19-county WIN Region. The highest unemployment rates in 2023 were those individuals 24 years old or younger, accounting for an unemployment rate of 29.1 percent for males and 25.1 percent for females. Overall, males in the region had a higher unemployment rate than females, with 6.3 percent and 6.2 percent respectively, in 2023. Native American job seekers have a difficult time finding employment, facing an unemployment rate of 28.3 percent. Those job seekers who identified as Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander also had a difficult time finding employment and had an unemployment rate of 14.7 percent. Asian job seekers had the lowest unemployment rate of 4.0 percent.



POPULATION DEMOGRAPHICS

2023 Census Population

According to data from the most recent Census Bureau (2023, ACS five-year estimates), 6,263,168 people were living in the 19-county WIN Region. The gender of the populace was split evenly, with 50.8 percent of the population identifying as female, and the other 49.2 percent identifying as male. A majority of the population identified as White (66.2 percent) with the second largest number of individuals identifying as Black or African American (17.1 percent). The region is facing an aging populace; with 31.2 percent of the population over the age of 54, compared to 30.6 percent under the age of 25.


Population Gender Demographics




2024 Current Workforce

While the Census Bureau data lags by about two years, Lightcast uses predictive modeling to estimate workforce information. In Q4 2024, the workforce had a total of 2,766,602 individuals working in Southeast Michigan. A slight majority, 50.9 percent (1,408,913 workers) were male, while 49.1 percent (1,357,689 workers) of the workforce was female. Most workers in the county identified as White, accounting for 73.4 percent of the workforce, while Black or African American workers totaled 15.2 percent of the workforce. Those identifying as Hispanic or Latino ethnicity accounted for 4.7 percent. A significant concentration of the workforce in WIN Region is between the age of 25 and 54 (62.6 percent), while 23.3 percent of workers are 55 and older.


Workforce Gender Demographics





Q4 REGIONAL COMMUTING PATTERNS

According to the most recent OnTheMap data set available from the Census Bureau, during 2021, the region's workforce consisted of 2,424,140 residents. There were 2,239,247 (92.4 percent) residents living and working within the 19-county region, while the remaining 184,893 residents (7.6 percent) traveled outside of the region for work. There were 2,438,135 workers employed in the region during 2021 with 198,888 workers (8.2 percent) residing outside of the border and commuting into the region. Based upon this information, it can be concluded that the southeast Michigan area is a net importer of jobs, with more workers commuting into the area for employment than commuting out for jobs.

Top Posted Jobs: Q4 2024

Registered Nurses is the top posted occupation for Q4 2024 with 12,232 unique online job postings, and requires a Bachelor's degree for entry. Retail Salespersons (7,839 postings) and Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers (4,531 postings) round out the top three demanded occupations, requiring no formal educational credential and a postsecondary nondegree award, respectively. Among the top 10 indemand jobs, only three require a Bachelor's degree, while six occupations required short- to moderate-term on-the-job training.




Top Posted Entry-Level Jobs: Q4 2024

Entry-level jobs, which usually require zero to two years of previous experience, accounted for 24.3 percent (59,100 online job ads) of postings in WIN region. More than half of the top ten entry-level occupations require a High School diploma or equivalent, or no formal educational credential. Those who enter the workforce with a High School diploma or equivalent are heavily demanded among entry-level occupations, accounting for 34.6 percent of entry-level postings. Registered Nurses were the top posted entry-level occupation with 5,732 postings, followed by Retail Salespersons with 1,577 postings.



AGRICULTURE OCCUPATION GROUP


WIN's agriculture occupation group brings together occupations that require knowledge of farming, livestock, the environment, and natural sciences. Occupations range from Farm Workers, Environmental Engineers, Meat Butchers, or Recreation Workers. There are approximately 11,800 openings for these positions each year in southeast Michigan.

According to Q4 2024 Lightcast data, the 84,260 workers in the Agriculture group are not particularly diverse. Just 14.3 percent of the related workforce is under 25. Female workers account for 36.2 percent of the current workforce and only 23.2 percent identify as a race other than White. As the labor force overall continues to change, this field would benefit from seeking a more diverse talent pool.

Race and Ethnicity Demographics



Top Posted Jobs

In Q4 2024, there were a total of 7,547 job postings for Agriculture workers, with Sales Representatives, Wholesale and Manufacturing, Technical and Scientific Products as the most sought-after occupation by Agriculture industry employers during Q4 2024, with 1,349 postings. Buyers and Purchasing Agents was in the second position with 1,036 postings. Other top posted jobs include Landscaping and Groundskeeping Workers (602 postings), Compliance Officers (396 postings), and Occupational Health and Safety Technicians (324 postings).

Wage Overview

Wages in the Agriculture field do not necessarily scale with education or experience as seen in other occupations. The Agriculture occupation group offers a relatively broad array of entry requirements, and a high volume of jobs are open to candidates with a High School diploma or equivalent. Over half of the top jobs pay over \$35 per hour. Sales Representatives, Wholesale and Manufacturing, Technical and Scientific Products, the top posted Agriculture job, offers a median hourly wage of \$59.74 per hour or an annual salary of about \$124,259.



BUSINESS AND FINANCE OCCUPATION GROUP


Jobs in the Business and Finance occupation group can be found in nearly every type of establishment or firm throughout the region. These workers need strong mathematical and accounting abilities along with project management and planning skills. Workers in this occupation group are in high demand in southeast Michigan, with about 34,800 job openings annually.



Business and Finance Worker Demographics

In Q4 2024, there were 325,735 workers in the Business and Finance occupation group. This group is primarily made up of males (52.0 percent) and between the ages of 25 and 54 (70.3 percent), with 48.0 percent of workers identifying as female and just 19.1 percent identifying as a racial minority. Also of note, 4.7 percent of the workers in the occupation group were under the age of 25, compared to the 25.1 percent 55 years of age or older.



Top Posted Jobs

In Q4 2024, there were a total of 33,950 job postings for Business and Finance workers, a decrease of 356 postings or 1.0 percent since Q3 2024. Sales Representatives, Wholesale and Manufacturing, Except Technical and Scientific Products was the most sought-after occupation by Business and Finance industry employers during Q4 2024 with 3,474 postings. General and Operations Managers was in the second position with 2,997 postings. Other top posted jobs include Project Management Specialists (2,147 postings), Financial Managers (2,058 postings), and Sales Managers (1,797 postings).



BUSINESS AND FINANCE OCCUPATION GROUP

Wage Overview

Wages in the Business and Finance field tend to scale with both education and experience. The Business and Finance occupation group offers a relatively broad array of entry requirements, though a majority of jobs require a Bachelor's degree. Over half of the top jobs pay over \$45 per hour. Sales Representatives, Wholesale and Manufacturing, Except Technical and Scientific Products, the top posted Business and Finance job, offers a median hourly wage of \$35.85 per hour or an annual salary of about \$74,568.




Jobs in the WIN Construction occupation group are associated with skilled trades, engineering, management, and planning. Many construction employers are slowly adopting online job search methods, so online job ads may not provide a complete picture of demand for these workers. Even so, it is an important and in-demand occupation group for southeast Michigan, with about 12,200 annual job openings and posting data provides a glimpse into employer needs.

According to Q4 2024 Lightcast data, the 102,248 workers in the Construction group are not particularly diverse. Just 11.5 percent of the related workforce is under 25. Female workers account for 4.2 percent of the current workforce and only 16.6 percent identify as a race other than White. Race and Ethnicity Demographics



Top Posted Jobs

There were a total of 5,272 job postings for Construction workers, with Construction Managers as the most sought-after occupation by Construction industry employers during Q4 2024, with 882 postings. 





















Race and Ethnicity Demographics














TDL Worker Demographics

Race and Ethnicity Demographics


