INTRODUCTION

ABOUT THIS REPORT

The Workforce Intelligence Network for Southeast Michigan (WIN) is a workforce collaborative comprised of seven Michigan Works! Agencies (MWAs) and ten community colleges in a 19-county region representing approximately 63% of the total labor force in Michigan. The counties in the WIN partnership include Clinton, Eaton, Genesee, Hillsdale, Huron, Ingham, Jackson, Lapeer, Lenawee, Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Oakland, St. Clair, Sanilac, Shiawassee, Tuscola, Washtenaw, and Wayne.

The WIN data and research team analyzes job posting data at the occupation level within eleven customized occupation groups built using specific Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) codes to provide more contextualized information. Occupation groups combine data for jobs with similar skillsets, educational attainment, and experience requirements, which provides a more in-depth snapshot of the current labor market when compared to traditional industry data based upon North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) codes. Occupation outlook sections utilize these metrics to identify and display the top in-demand jobs, entry-level requirements, and earning potential.

WIN produces a quarterly 19-county WIN region report using data from all eleven occupation groups. A city of Detroit report is also produced quarterly, focusing on five occupation groups related to the Detroit labor market. County reports are produced annually and focus on five occupation groups chosen to reflect the labor market specific to the county.

This report highlights labor market information and real-time job posting data for Washtenaw County, including a workforce overview that identifies key components of the area's labor market such as labor force status, demographic, and commuting data. WIN's analysis of online job postings, a proxy for employer demand, is a pioneering method for tracking the labor market's health. The data is used to provide real-time demand and job posting information for both employers and job seekers. This report analyzes the 2024 labor market information from Washtenaw County for the Business and Finance, Engineering and Design, Health Care, Information Technology (IT), and Skilled Trades occupation groups.


Annual State of the Labor Market

Over the course of CY2024, both the labor force and employment decreased by 516 individuals (0.3 percent) and 1,066 workers (0.5 percent) respectively, while unemployment increased by 550 workers. The unemployment rate remained relatively stable in 2024, increasing 0.3 percentage points from 3.3 percent in 2023 to 3.6 percent in 2024. Registered Nurses top the list as the most demanded occupation in 2024, accounting for 2,708 job postings. The Health Care occupation group continues to be heavily demanded in Washtenaw County.

Annual Labor Market Information

The labor force in Washtenaw County increased in 2024, decreasing by 516 individuals (0.3 percent) from the prior year. Employment also fell by 1,066 workers (0.5 percent) over the same period, while unemployment rose by 550 workers (8.0 percent) for a total of 7,406 unemployed workers in 2024. While this marks a significant improvement from the 6.5 percent spike seen in 2020, it has not yet returned to the prepandemic low of 2.9 percent recorded in 2019. Nonetheless, the rate remains relatively stable.

Annual Labor Force, Employment, Unemployment Rate 2014–2024



Quarterly Employer Demand Overview

Employer demand in Washtenaw County declined sharply from 14,482 job postings in Q3 2023 to a low of 11,304 in Q4 2023, before recovering slightly in early 2024. Demand increased to 12,993 in Q1 2024 and remained relatively stable through Q2 (12,358 posting) and Q3 (13,049 posting), suggesting a period of moderate stability. However, the year ended with another decline, dropping to 12,024 postings in Q4 2024. Overall, while employer demand in 2024 showed some recovery from the previous year's low, it remained below the Q3 2023 peak, indicating a cautious labor market.



During 2024, there were 66,342 job postings, 8,148 fewer than the 74,490 postings made during 2023 in Washtenaw County. The third quarter saw the highest demand for the year with 13,049 average monthly postings, a 1.1 percent increase since Q2 2024. The top posted job occupations in 2024 include Registered Nurses, Retail Salespersons, Home Health and Personal Care Aides, First-Line Supervisors of Retail Sales Workers, and Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers. Of the 66,342 unique postings in Washtenaw County during 2024, there were 15,483 (23.3 percent) which required a High School diploma or equivalent, while 23,754 postings (35.8 percent) required a College degree. An additional 10,696 postings (16.1 percent) required an advanced degree. The high demand for Health Care jobs within the County drives this high demand for workers with various skill sets.



The quarterly labor market experienced some year-over-year weakening in 2024, but signs of short-term recovery emerged by the end of the year. From Q4 2023 to Q4 2024, the labor force shrank by 1.3 percent (2,748 individuals), and employment declined by 2.3 percent (4,615 individuals), reflecting overall softening. Unemployment rose by 31.3 percent over the year, reaching 7,830 workers, and the unemployment rate increased from 2.8 percent to 3.8 percent. However, between the third and fourth quarters of 2024, all major indicators showed improvement: the labor force and employment grew by 1.5 percent and 2.0 percent, respectively, while unemployment declined by nearly 9 percent. This suggests a potential turning point for the region's labor market following mid-year challenges. LABOR FORCE, EMPLOYMENT, AND UNEMPLOYMENT

Following labor force fluctuations throughout 2024, labor force participation totaled 204,180 individuals, a slight decrease of 516 individuals since 2023. Employment also declined to 196,774 workers in 2024, a decrease of 1,066 workers. Despite the drop in both labor force and employment, unemployment rose to 7,406 individuals, an increase of 550 compared to 2023, though still well below the peak of 12,951 in 2020. This imbalance led to a modest rise in the unemployment rate, which increased by 0.3 percentage points to 3.6 percent in 2024.

CENSUS 2023 LABOR FORCE DEMOGRAPHICS

During 2023, the most recent census year, there were about 195,937 people in the labor force, meaning that these individuals were either working or seeking employment in Washtenaw County. Slightly over half of the population, 187,381 individuals (50.9 percent) living in the region were actively working. The highest unemployment rates were seen in those age 24 years old or younger. Males under the age of 25 face an unemployment rate of 20.8 percent, while females under the age of 25 report an unemployment rate of 18.6 percent. Black or African American job seekers also have a difficult time finding employment, facing an unemployment rate of 9.8 percent.


2023 Census Population

According to data from the most recent Census Bureau 2023 ACS Five-Year estimates, the population in Washtenaw County decreased by about 0.5 percent between 2022 and 2023. During 2023, there were 368,394 people living in the county. The gender of the populace was split evenly, with 49.9 percent of the population identifying as female and the other 50.1 percent identifying as male. A majority of the population identified as White (69.9 percent) with the second largest number of individuals identifying as Black or African American (11.6 percent). The region is facing an aging populace; with 26.6 percent of the population over the age of 54, compared to 36.1 percent under the age of 25.


2024 Current Workforce

In 2024, the workforce had a total of 230,076 individuals working in Washtenaw County. A slight majority, 52.6 percent (123,143 workers) were female, while 47.4 percent (110,835 workers) of the workforce was male. Most workers in the county identified as White, accounting for 75.5 percent of the workforce, while Black or African American workers totaled 11.5 percent of the workforce. Those identifying as Asian ethnicity accounted for 5.3 percent. A significant concentration of the workforce in Washtenaw County is between the age of 25 and 54 (62.2 percent), while 21.6 percent of workers are 55 and older.


Population Gender Demographics




Workforce Gender Demographics




2024 REGIONAL COMMUTING PATTERNS


WASHTENAW COUNTY

According to the most recent OnTheMap data set available from the Census Bureau, during 2021, Washtenaw County's workforce consisted of 139,516 residents. There were 76,701 (55.0 percent) residents living and working in Washtenaw County, while the remaining 62,815 residents (45.0 percent) traveled outside of the County for work. There were 177,338 workers employed in the County during 2021. Of those, 100,637 workers (56.7 percent) lived outside of the County borders and commuted in for work. Based upon this information, it can be concluded that Washtenaw County is a net importer of jobs, with more workers commuting into the area for employment than leaving.





Top Posted Jobs

Registered Nurses is the top posted occupation for 2024 with 2,708 unique online job postings, and requires a Bachelor's degree for entry. Retail Salespersons (1,851 postings) and Home Health and Personal Care Aides (1,347 postings) round out the top three demanded occupations, requiring no formal educational credential and High school diploma or equivalent, respectively. Among the top 10 in-demand jobs, less than half require a High School diploma or equivalent, while half require some level of on-the-job training.

Top Posted Entry-Level Jobs

Entry-level jobs, which usually require zero to two years of previous experience, account for 26.0 percent of postings in Washtenaw County. More than half of the top ten entry-level occupations require a High School diploma or equivalent. Those who enter the workforce with a High School diploma or equivalent are heavily demanded among entry-level occupations, accounting for 33.1 percent of entry-level postings. Registered Nurses were the top posted entry-level occupation with 1,235 postings, followed by First-Line Supervisors of Retail Sales Workers with 399 postings.



BUSINESS AND FINANCE OCCUPATION GROUP


Jobs in the Business and Finance occupation group can be found in nearly every type of establishment/firm throughout the region. These workers need strong mathematical and accounting abilities along with project management and planning skills. Workers in this occupation group are in high demand in southeast Michigan, with about 21,000 job openings annually.



Business and Finance Worker Demographics

In 2023, there were 23,079 workers in the Business and Finance occupation group. This group is primarily made up of males (52.0 percent) and between the age of 25 and 54 (71.1 percent), with 48.0 percent of workers identifying as female and just 17.7 percent identifying as a racial minority. Also of note was that 5.6 percent of the workers in the occupation group were under the age of 25, compared to the 23.2 percent 55 years of age or older.

Race and Ethnicity Demographics



Top Posted Jobs

In 2024, there were a total of 8,498 job postings for Business and Finance workers, with Sales Representatives, Wholesale and Manufacturing, Except Technical and Scientific Products as the most sought-after occupation by Business and Finance industry employers with 732 postings. General and Operations Managers was in second position with 697 postings. Other top posted jobs include Project Management Specialists (585 postings), Financial Managers (469 postings), and Accountants and Auditors (446 postings).

Wage Overview

Most business and finance related jobs offer high wages, providing a lucrative opportunity for job seekers willing to attain the necessary education. The Business and Finance occupation group offers a relatively broad array of entry requirements, though a majority of jobs require a Bachelor's degree. At least half of the top jobs pay over \$39.77 per hour. Sales Representatives, Wholesale and Manufacturing, Except Technical and Scientific Products, the top posted Business and Finance job, offers a median hourly wage of \$35.74 per hour or an annual salary of about \$74,339.




Jobs in the manufacturing industry can range from assembly and production, skilled trades and technicians, designers and engineers, and even computer-related occupations such as software development. Demand for engineers in the region has been consistent, and employment has been growing quickly. There are about 8,500 openings annually for engineers in southeast Michigan.



Engineering & Design Worker Demographics

According to 2024 Lightcast data, the 5,840 workers in the Engineering and Design group are only somewhat diverse. Just 6.3 percent of the related workforce is under 25, likely due to the consistently high educational requirements. Female workers account for 17.1 percent of the current workforce and only 20.2 percent identify as a race other than White. As the labor force overall continues to change, this field would benefit from seeking a more diverse talent pool.

Race and Ethnicity Demographics



In 2024, there were a total of 2,642 job postings for Engineering and Design workers, with Civil Engineers as the most sought-after occupation by Engineering and Design industry employers with 508 postings. Mechanical Engineers was in the second position with 408 postings. Other top posted jobs include Electrical Engineers (392 postings), Industrial Engineers (237 postings), and Engineers, All Other (114 postings).

Wage Overview

Wages in the Engineering and Design field tend to scale with both education and experience. The Engineering and Design occupation group offers a broad array of entry requirements, though a majority of jobs require a Bachelor's degree. At least half of the top jobs pay over \$44.00 per hour. Civil Engineers, the top posted Engineering and Design job, offers a median hourly wage of \$39.54 per hour or an annual salary of about \$82.243.



HEALTH CARE OCCUPATION GROUP


WIN's Health Care occupation group includes jobs related to healthcare support and practitioners. Employment in this group has been consistently growing, with more Health Care workers needed to care for Michigan's aging population. Registered Nurses are routinely the most in-demand job in this group. Annually, there are about 23,600 job openings for these positions across southeast Michigan, and this is projected to continue increasing.



Health Care Worker Demographics

In 2024, there were 38,311 workers in the Health Care occupation group. This group is primarily made up of females (72.4 percent) and between the age of 25 and 54 (69.8 percent), with 27.6 percent of workers identifying as male and 27.8 percent identifying as a racial minority. Also, of note was that 8.7 percent of the workers in the occupation group were under the age of 25, compared to the 21.4 percent 55 years of age or older.

Top Posted Jobs

In 2024, there were a total of 11,288 job postings for Health Care workers, with Registered Nurses as the most sought-after occupation by Health Care industry employers with 2,708 postings. Home Health and Personal Care Aides was in the second position with 1,347 postings. Other top posted jobs include Health Technologists and Technicians, All Other (641 postings), Medical Assistants (534 postings), and Pharmacy Technicians (443 postings).





Race and Ethnicity Demographics








