About This Report

The Workforce Intelligence Network for Southeast Michigan (WIN) partnership is a collaboration of Michigan Works! Agencies (MWAs) and community colleges across a 16-county region in Michigan. The counties in the WIN partnership include: Genesee, Hillsdale, Huron, Jackson, Lapeer, Lenawee, Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Oakland, Saint Clair, Sanilac, Shiawassee, Tuscola, Washtenaw, and Wayne, along with the City of Detroit.

This report highlights labor market information and real-time job posting data for the City of Detroit. A workforce overview is provided within identifying key components of the area's labor market including labor force status, demographic, and commuting data. WIN's analysis of online job postings, a proxy for employer demand, is a pioneering method for tracking the health of the labor market. This data is used to provide a real-time demand overview, detailing posting related findings for both employers and job seekers. WIN's data and research team analyzes job posting data at the occupation level within eleven customized occupation groups built using specific Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) codes to provide more contextualized information. Occupation groups combine data for jobs with similar skillsets, educational attainment, and experience requirements, which provides a more in-depth snapshot of the current labor market when compared to traditional industry data based upon North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) codes. Occupation outlook sections utilize these metrics to identify and display the top in-demand jobs, their entry requirements, and their earning potential. WIN produces a 16county region report quarterly using data from all eleven occupation groups. A report focused on the city of Detroit is also produced quarterly, focusing on five occupation groups related to Detroit's labor market. County reports are produced annually and focus on five occupation groups chosen to reflect the labor market specific to the county.

This report analyzes data from the third quarter of 2019 in the City of Detroit and includes comparison analysis to the second quarter of 2019. For the City of Detroit, the business and finance, energy, health care, IT, and skilled trades occupation groups are analyzed.




State of the Labor Market in the City of Detroit

During the third quarter of 2019, the labor force and employment figures in Detroit has increased, up this quarter since Q2 2019, continuing the steady growth seen throughout last year. This quarter, as compared to Q2 2019, the labor force increased by 2.4 percent, comparatively, employment in Detroit has also increased by 1.4 percent. The quarterly unemployment rate in Q3 increased by 0.9 percentage points from the 8.7 percent recorded in Q2 2019. This increase could indicate that discouraged workers are re-entering the workforce due to the increase in job postings this quarter. Employer demand for health care workers is still on the rise among the five key groups analyzed for the city, with 15,162 job postings during Q3 2019. The business and finance and skills trades occupation groups also offer great job opportunities for active job seekers. Many business and finance occupation postings were open to workers with two or fewer years of experience, including 2,698 postings in Q3 2019. Skilled trades postings advertised 690 opportunities for those with a high school diploma and a willingness to undertake training.

Annual Labor Market Information


Continuing a ten-year high, the annual labor force in the city of Detroit increased by 3,547 individuals between YTD 2018 and 2019. Similarly, employment also grew annually between 2018 and YTD 2019 by 3,190 workers. While the YTD employment and labor force both saw an increase through Q3 2019, the unemployment rate in the city of Detroit has remained constant, from an annual 2018 rate of 9.0 percent to a YTD 2019 rate of 9.0 percent.

Quarterly Employer Demand Overview

Data obtained year to date (YTD) for the third quarter of 2019 indicate that employer demand has remained strong, since the end of Q2 2019. There were 79,480 unique postings in the city of Detroit. Demand in Q3 2019 increased by 8,876 postings from the 70,604 unique postings reported during Q2 2019. The increase in the number of ads indicate supply and demand for jobs and workers, has remained strong into the fourth quarter of 2019.

The health care occupation group experienced strong growth through Q2 2019 and has continued the trend into Q3 2019.

Employers seeking health care workers showed sustained demand growth during Q2 2019 and into Q3 2019, resulting in a Q3 2019 total of 15,162 ads. This remains the highest-posting occupation group in the third quarter of 2019. Registered Nurses have also remained by far, the most in-demand job during Q3. Other major occupation groups such as business and finance and information technology (IT) also showed strong growth this quarter, with 9,585 and 13,723 job postings respectively. Accountants and Auditors and Software Developers, Applications come in a close second and third for the top 3 occupations demanded for Q3 2019. Health care educational requirements vary from a high school diploma or certification for technician and assistant positions, to bachelor's degrees for occupations such as nurses, and advanced degrees for physician roles. Postings by Occupation Group Q3 2019



A bachelor's degree is the most in-demand educational credential for all openings in the city, specified in 28.7 percent of job postings.

Of the 79,480 unique postings in the city of Detroit during Q3 2019, 27,409 (34.5 percent) required a college degree. An additional 7,874 postings (9.9 percent) required an advanced degree. This is significantly higher than across southeast Michigan as a whole: regionwide, 22.7 percent of postings require a bachelor's degree while 7.2 percent post requirements for advanced education. The high demand for business and technology roles within the city limits drives this high demand for college education.


Detroit's unemployment rate in Q3 2019 has increased by 0.9 percentage points to 9.6 percent. In Q2 2019, it was recorded at 8.7 percent.

In Q3 2019, unemployment has increased by 2,943 workers since Q2 2019. The annual unemployment rate for both 2018 and YTD 2019 has remained the same, reported at 9 percent. Labor Force, Employment, and Unemployment

The labor market in the City of Detroit has been growing steadily year over year since 2010, though there is still fluctuation between quarters. The labor force change from Q2 2019 to Q3 2019 is an increase of 6,123 workers. Quarterly employment in the city also increased from Q2 2019, by 3,180 workers. With the labor force and employment showing strong growth into the fourth quarter of 2019. The quarterly unemployment rate increased by 0.9 percentage points, recorded from 8.7 percent in Q2 2019 to 9.6 percent YTD in Q3 2019.


Population Demographics

According to the data from the most recent Census Bureau 2017 ACS Five Year estimates, during 2017, 679,865 people were living in the city of Detroit. The sex of the populace was split almost evenly, with about 52.7 percent of the population identifying as female, and the other 47.3 percent identifying as male. The majority of the population identified as black or African American (79.1 percent) with the second largest number of individuals identifying as white (14.1 percent). The city skews younger than the surrounding region; 25.6 percent of population was over the age of 55, compared to 36.2 percent under the age of 25.

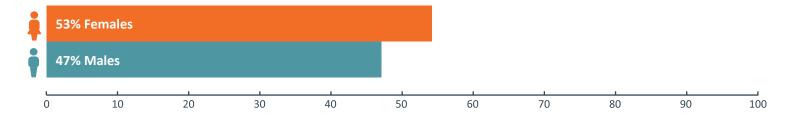

Labor Market Demographics

During 2017, the most recent census year, there were about 283,000 people in the labor force, meaning they were either working or looking for work, in the city of Detroit. The 282,932 individuals (41.6 percent) participating in the labor force make up a little under half of those living in the city. The highest unemployment rates were seen in those aged 24 years old or younger. Females under the age of 19 face an unemployment rate of 46.5 percent. Native American job seekers also have a difficult time finding employment, facing an unemployment rate of 24.5 percent.

Regional Commuting Patterns

According to the most recent OnTheMap data set available from the Census Bureau, during 2015, the city's workforce consisted of 177,431 residents. 58,730 (33.1 percent) of the residents lived and worked within Detroit's city limits, while the remaining 118,701 residents (65.9 percent) traveled outside of the region for work. There were 234,493 workers employed in the city during 2015. Of those, 175,763 workers (75.0 percent) lived outside of the city's borders and commuted in. Thus, Detroit is a net importer of jobs, with more workers commuting into the area for employment than leaving. However, the city has a much higher percentage of both inbound and outbound commuters than many areas.






Where City of Detroit Workers Live



Top Posted Jobs: Q3 2019

Registered Nurses has remained the highest in-demand occupation during Q3 2019, with 8,795 unique online job postings. Always a high-demand occupation, nurses have remained the highest since Q4 2018. Software Developers, Applications are the second largest occupation with 4,359 unique postings in Q3 2019. Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers, third top occupation, must have a postsecondary nondegree award to enter and provides short-term on-the-job training. A bachelor's degree is required for over half of the top 20 jobs in the city. Other indemand jobs that also typically require a four-year degree include Computer Occupations, All Other and Sales Managers.





Accountants and Auditors were the highest in-demand business and finance occupation during Q3 2019, with 1,279 postings, followed closely by Management Analysts with 1,090 postings. While most of the top jobs typically require a bachelor's degree, Sales Representatives, Wholesale and Manufacturing, Except Technical and Scientific Products (782 postings), and Insurance Sales Agents (600 postings), only require a high school diploma and no work experience coupled with moderate-term on-the-job training.

Most business and finance related jobs offer high wages, making for a lucrative opportunity for job seekers willing to attain the necessary education. The top posted business and finance job, Accountants and Auditors, offers median hourly wages of \$35.99, translating to annual earnings of approximately \$71,980. Additional experience may lead to a role as a Marketing or Financial Manager, opening the door to median wages around \$65.39 hourly, or about \$130,780 annually.





Energy Wage Overview

The high demand for engineers and managers in the energy field creates lucrative opportunities for job seekers willing to overcome the educational barriers related to these jobs. The top posted energy job, Electrical Engineers, offers a median hourly wage of \$43.85, or annual earnings of approximately \$87,700. Construction and technician focused positions generally have shorter educational requirements than engineers and pay higher median wages, \$31.98, than similar occupations in other industries.







Health Care Wage Overview

Wages in health care are generally on the higher end of the pay scale with education, training, and experience being needed for most top jobs. Although this group offers a broad array of occupations requiring higher education, there are a number of jobs open to those with a high school diploma or equivalent or a postsecondary nondegree award, that pay more than the region's median wage of \$17.81 per hour. Registered Nurses, the top posted health care job in Q3 2019, offers a median hourly wage of \$36.25 or an annual salary of nearly \$72,500.











Maintenance and Repair Workers, General were the highest in-demand skilled trades occupation during Q3 2019, with 713 postings. Other top posted jobs include First-Line Supervisors of Production and Operating Workers (424 postings), Industrial Production Managers (167 postings), Industrial Machinery Mechanics (116 postings) and Machinists (89 postings). While most top occupations require a high school diploma, coupled with moderate-term on-the-job training, Industrial Production Managers typically require a bachelor's degree.
