About This Report

The Workforce Intelligence Network for Southeast Michigan (WIN) partnership is a collaboration of Michigan Works! Agencies (MWAs) and community colleges across a 19-county region in Michigan. The counties in the WIN partnership include Clinton, Eaton, Genesee, Hillsdale, Huron, Ingham, Jackson, Lapeer, Lenawee, Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Oakland, St. Clair, Sanilac, Shiawassee, Tuscola, Washtenaw, and Wayne, along with the City of Detroit.

The WIN data and research team analyzes job posting data at the occupation level within eleven customized occupation groups built using specific Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) codes to provide more contextualized information. Occupation groups combine data for jobs with similar skillsets, educational attainment, and experience requirements, which provides a more in-depth snapshot of the current labor market when compared to traditional industry data based upon North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) codes. Occupation outlook sections utilize these metrics to identify and display the top in-demand jobs, entry-level requirements, and earning potential.

WIN produces a quarterly 19-county region report using data from all eleven occupation groups. A report focused on the city of Detroit is also produced quarterly, focusing on five occupation groups related to the Detroit labor market. County reports are produced annually and focus on five occupation groups chosen to reflect the labor market specific to the county.

This report highlights labor market information and real-time job posting data for the City of Detroit, including a workforce overview that identifies key components of the area's labor market such as labor force status, demographic, and commuting data. WIN's analysis of online job postings, a proxy for employer demand, is a pioneering method for tracking the labor market's health. This data is used to provide real-time demand and job posting information for both employers and job seekers. This report analyzes the fourth quarter of 2021 labor market information from the City of Detroit for the Business and Finance, Energy, Healthcare, Information Technology (IT), and Skilled Trades occupation groups.

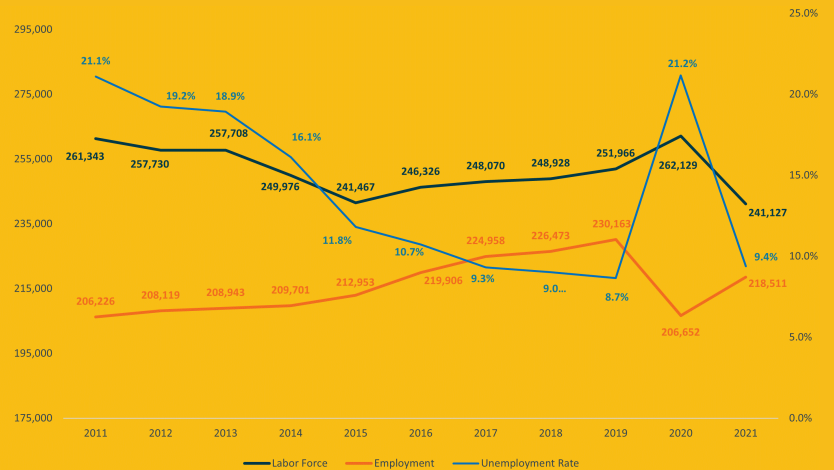
State of the Labor Market in the City of Detroit

The city of Detroit saw growth in both the labor force and overall employment, as the labor market continued to experience major shifts in hiring and skills demanded due to the COVID-19 crisis. Despite this shift in demand, the labor force, employment, and unemployment figures all increased from Q3 to Q4. The number of unemployed workers saw the highest jump, increasing 12.7 percent, with the size of the labor force increasing by 2.6 percent and the number of employed individuals increasing by 1.7 percent. Registered Nurses accounted for 2,939 job postings, coming in as the most in-demand occupation, with Healthcare topping the list of the most in-demand occupation groups in Detroit.

Annual Labor Market Information

Due to the ongoing pandemic and other labor market factors, Detroit's labor force has been in steady decline since 2020, decreasing 8 percent, for a 2021 labor force total of 241,127 workers. Despite a decrease in the number of workers in Detroit, employment has increased by 5.7 percent (11,858) over that same period. After experiencing an unemployment rate peak of 21.2 percent in 2020, Q4 saw a decrease of 11.8 percentage points to a low of 9.4 percent. While large swings in employment and unemployment data are expected as an indicator of economic recovery, the city's shrinking labor force may impact future labor market trends.

2011–2021

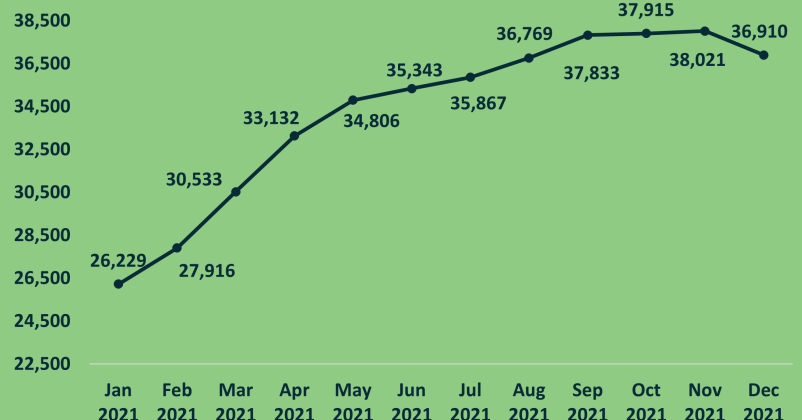

Quarterly Employer Demand Overview

Between Q3 and Q4, employer demand has increased, with an additional 2,377 unique postings for the City of Detroit, for a total of 112,846 postings. November had the highest recorded postings in 2021 with 38,021 postings, a 45 percent increase (11,792 postings) from January 2021. This steady increase in job postings is a positive indicator of economic recovery from the COVID-19 crisis.

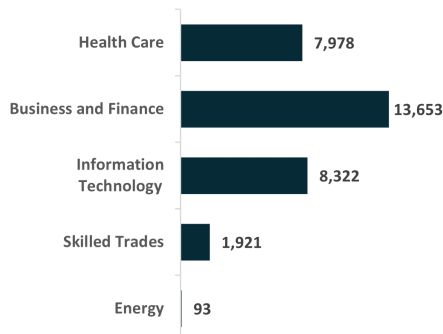

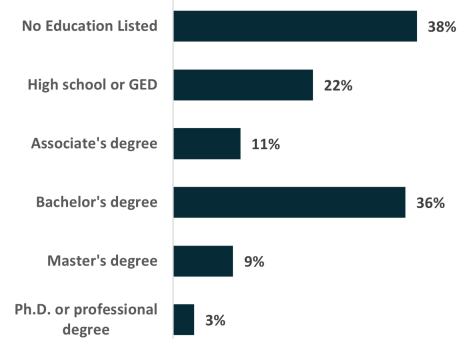
Healthcare, Business and Finance, and Information Technology occupation groups were the highest posting employers in Q4. The top posted job titles include Registered Nurses, Computer Occupation, All Other, Software Developers and Software Quality Assurance Analysts and Testers, and Personal Service Managers, all Other. More information about in-demand job postings can be found on page 7.

Of the 60,341 unique postings in the City of Detroit during Q4, 47 percent required a college degree, while an additional 12 percent required an advanced degree. The high demand for Business and Finance and Information Technology roles within the city drives this high demand for college education.

Detroit's labor force experienced positive growth quarter over quarter in 2021. After dropping 13 percent from Q4 2020 to Q1 2021, the Q4 labor force number still remains 7.6 percent lower than the Q4 2020 high of 268,323. Employment and unemployment figures have followed the labor force ebb and flow, with Q4 ending at a 2.5 percent employment increase from Q4 2020 and a 53.1 percent decrease in unemployment over the same time period. LABOR FORCE, EMPLOYMENT, AND UNEMPLOYMENT

The labor force in the City of Detroit experienced positive growth year over year from 2015 through 2020. 2021 marked an 8.0 percent decline to a low of 241,127 workers. Employment showed a similar trend, with positive growth year after year from 2011 through 2019; the COVID-19 pandemic ushered in a significant drop, with employment dipping 11.4 percent in 2020. As shutdown measures were lifted, the City of Detroit experienced positive employment growth throughout 2020 (5.7 percent) and a decrease in unemployment (-59.2 percent), with the 2021 unemployment rate dropping to 9.4 percent.

CENSUS 2020 LABOR FORCE DEMOGRAPHICS

During 2020, there were 286,678 individuals in the labor force, meaning they were either working or looking for work. Employed workers make up 85.1 percent of the city's labor force. The highest unemployment rates in 2020 were seen in those aged 24 years old or younger, with 65.6 percent of unemployed individuals identifying as males compared to 55.5 percent of unemployed individuals identifying as female. Overall, males have a higher unemployment rate than females, at 17.1 percent and 12.9 percent respectively. Black or African American, Native American, and job seekers that identify as Two or More Races faced the most challenges in securing employment, with each group experiencing an unemployment rate of approximately 17 percent in 2020.

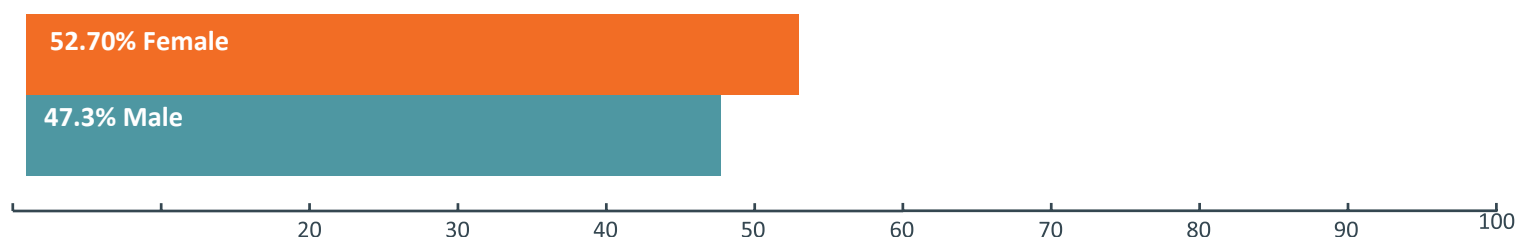

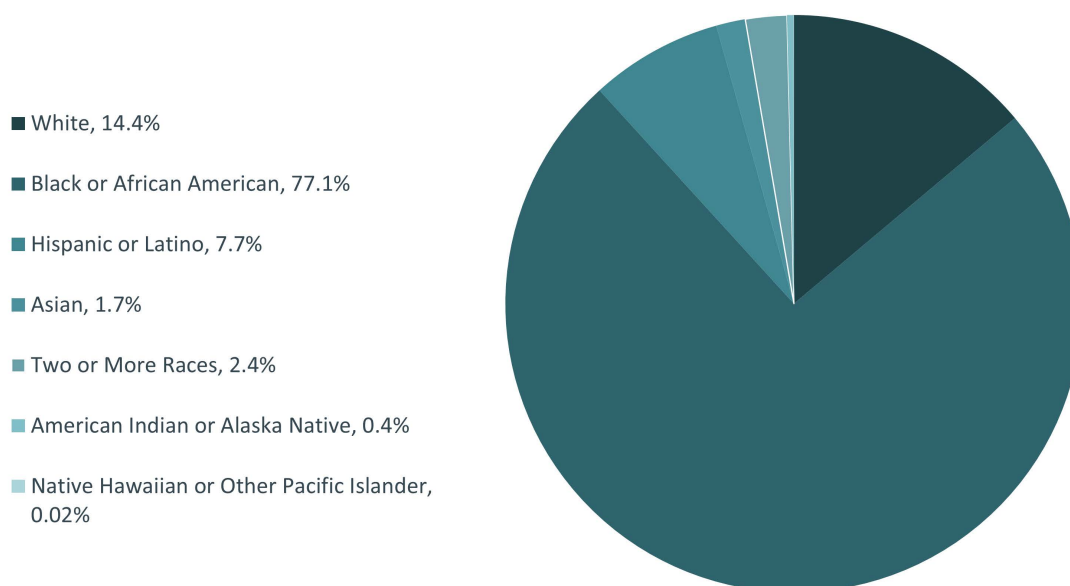
2020 Census Population

According to the Census Bureau 2020 ACS Five Year estimates, the City of Detroit had a population of 672,351 people. The sex of the populace was split almost evenly, with about 52.7 percent of the population identifying as female, and the other 47.3 percent identifying as male. The majority of the population identified as Black or African American (77.1 percent) with the second largest number of individuals identifying as White (14.4 percent). The city's age demographics skew younger than the surrounding region; 26.0 percent of the population was over the age of 54, compared to 35.0 percent under the age of 25, while 39.1 percent of the population fell between the ages of 25-54.

Population Race Demographics



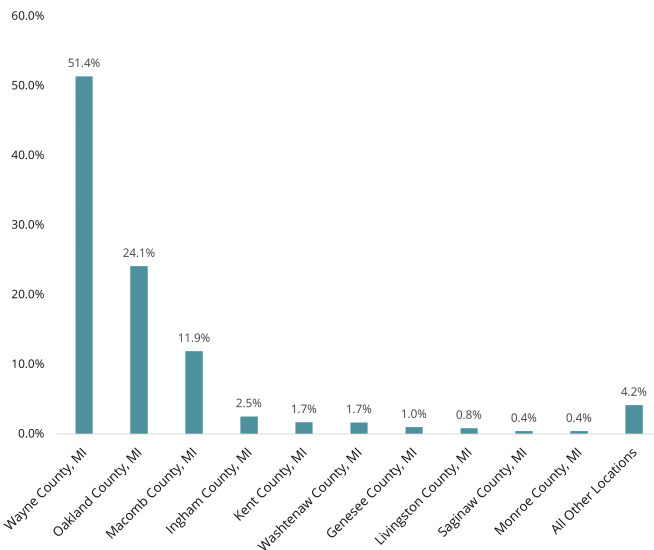

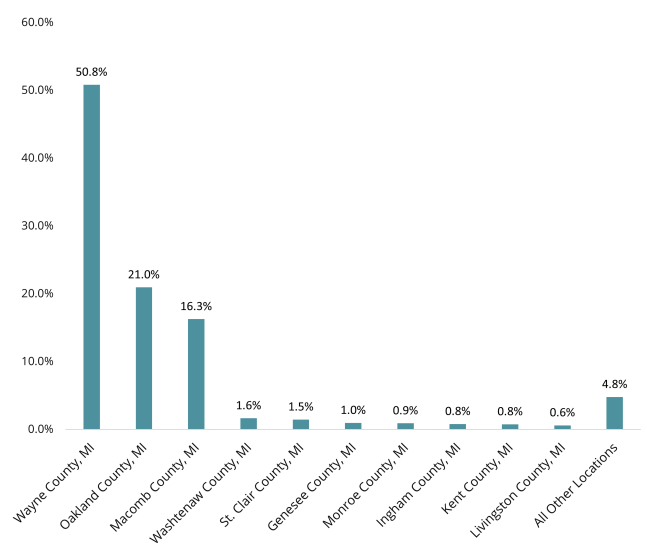
REGIONAL COMMUTING PATTERNS

According to the most recent OnTheMap data set from the Census Bureau Detroit's 2019 workforce consisted of 195,233 residents. 31.7 percent of the residents also worked in the city, while the remaining 68.3 percent traveled outside for work. With 235,654 workers employed in the city during 2019 there were 73.7 percent living outside of the city and commuting in. While there is a higher percentage of both inbound and outbound commuters in Detroit than other areas of the WIN regions, Detroit is ultimately a net importer of jobs, with more workers commuting into the area for employment than leaving.

Where City of Detroit Residents Work

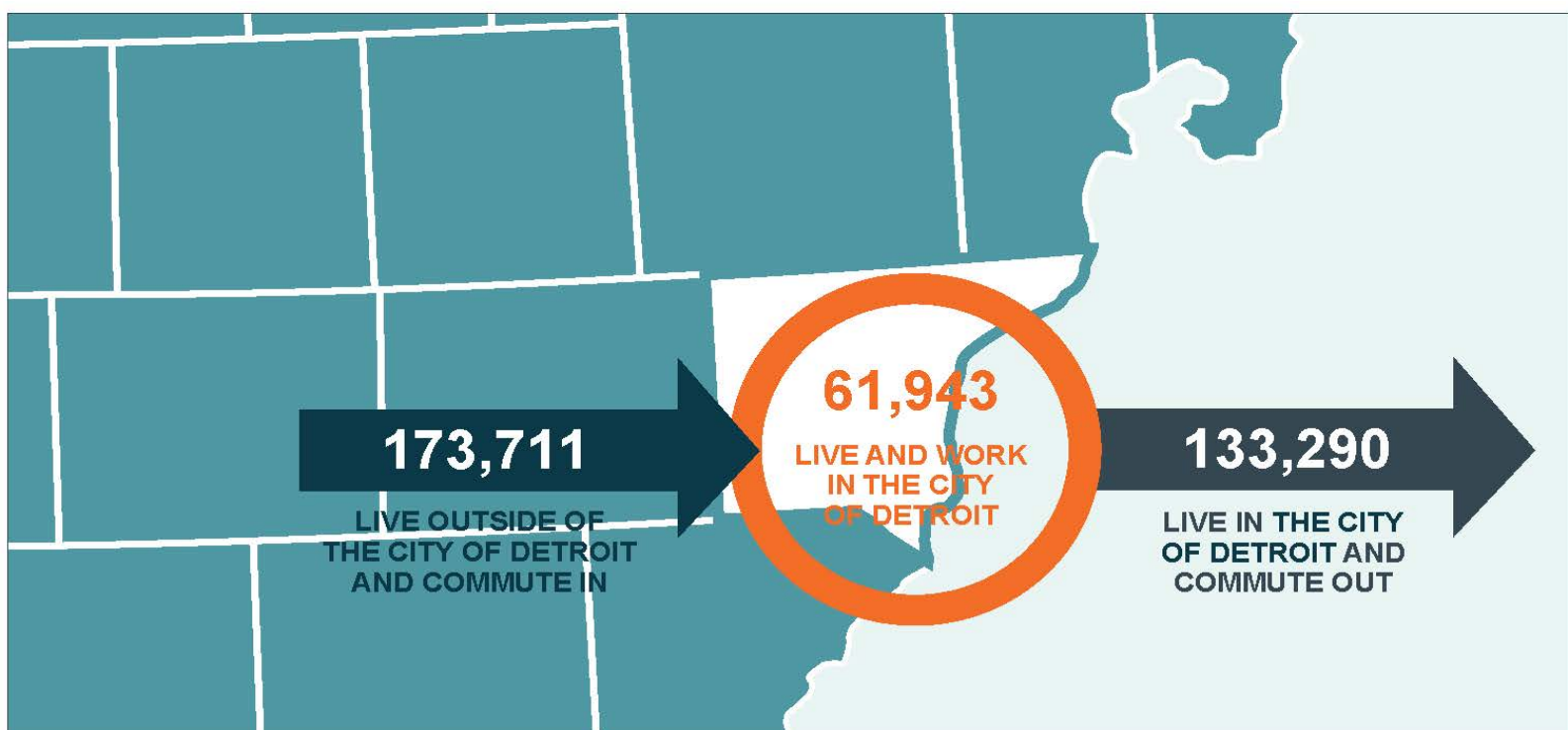


Where City of Detroit Workers Live

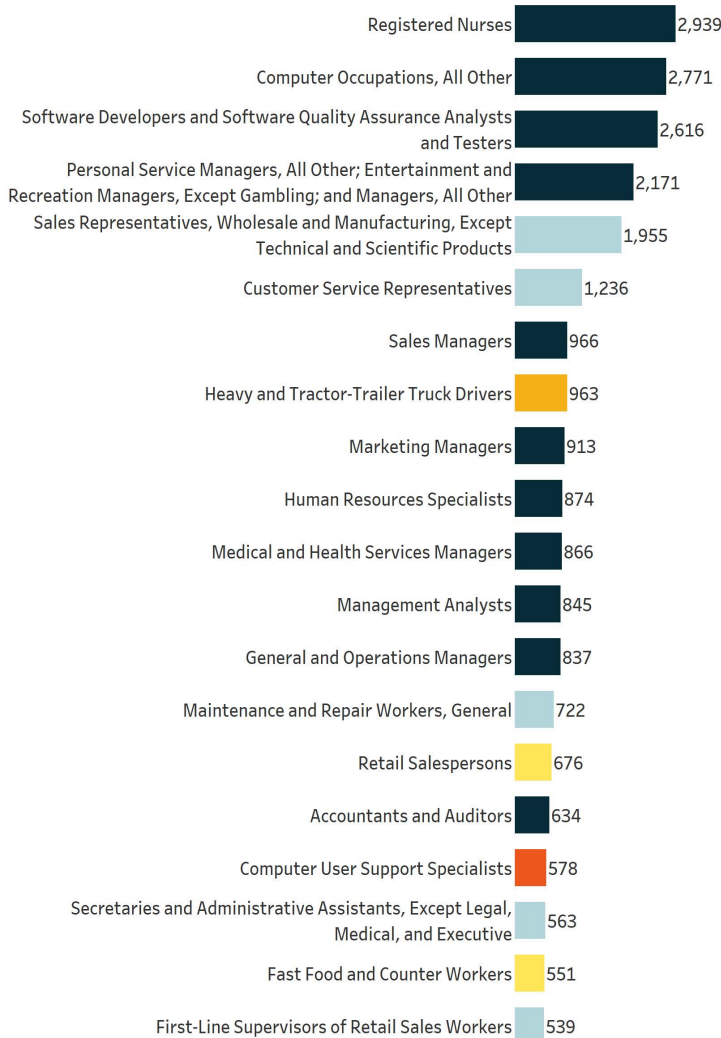

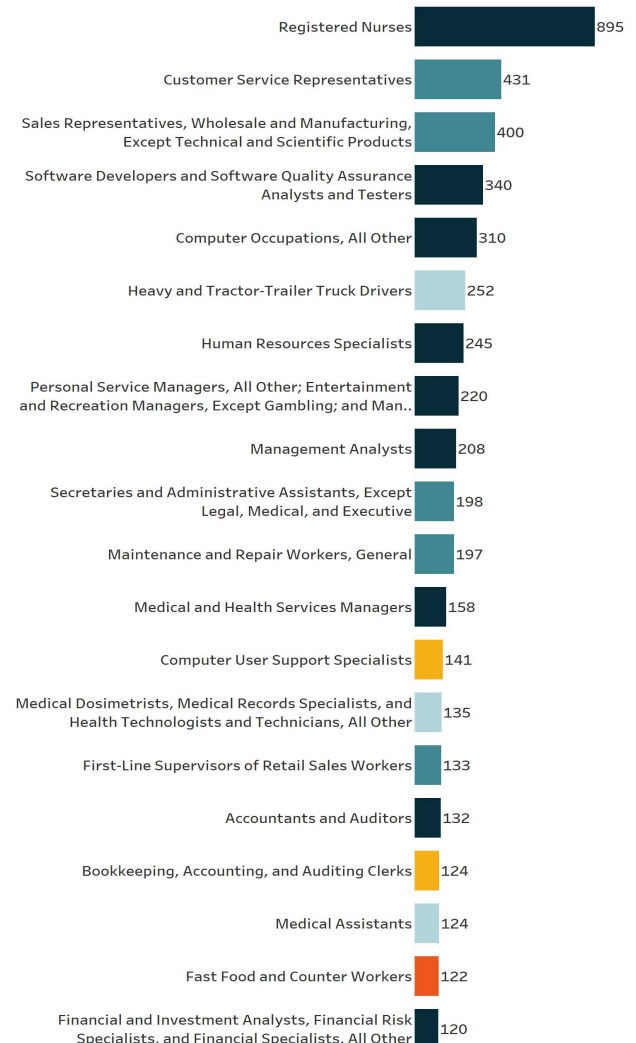
Registered Nurses has remained the highest in-demand occupation since Q4 2018, with 2,939 unique online job postings. Computer Occupations, All Other is the second largest occupation with 2,771 postings. Software Developers and Software Quality Assurance Analysts and Testers (2,616 postings) round out the top three occupations in Q4. The majority of these positions require a bachelor's degree, which is common in over half of the top 20 posted jobs for the city.

Top Posted Entry-Level Jobs

Entry-level jobs, which usually require zero to two years of previous experience, account for 20.7 percent of postings in Detroit. Six of the top ten entry level occupations require a bachelor's degree, while the remaining four require a high school diploma or postsecondary non-degree award. Those who enter the workforce with a college degree can expect entry wages nearly double from those without. Registered Nurses were the top posted entry-level job with 895 postings requiring zero to two years of experience and a bachelor's degree.

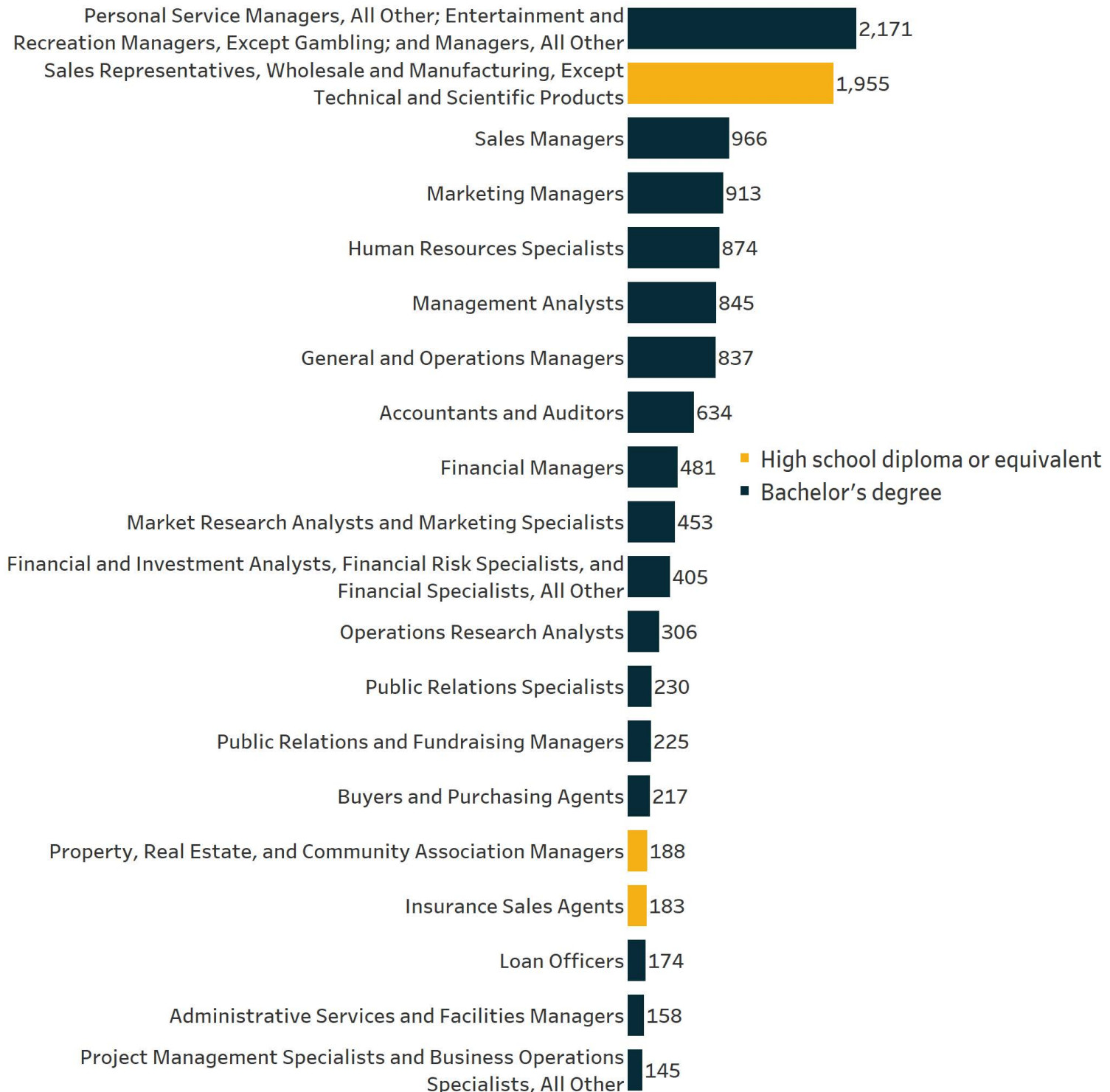
The Business and Finance occupation group offers high paying job opportunities for workers. A bachelor's degree is the most in-demand education level in Q4, as noted in 7,971 postings. A master's degree is the second most in-demand education level with 1,716 postings, while 4,126 postings do not specify any education level. The majority of posts did not specify a required length of experience, with approximately half of the postings having listed a requirement of two or more years of experience.

Top Posted Jobs

The Business and Finance occupation group with the highest number of Q4 postings (2,171) was Personal Service Managers, All Other; Entertainment and Recreation Managers, Except Gambling; and Managers, All Other. While most of the top jobs typically require a bachelor's degree, the second highest-posting occupation group, Sales Representatives, Wholesale and Manufacturing, Except Technical and Scientific Products (1,955 postings), and Insurance Sales Agents (183 postings), both require a high school diploma and offer moderate on-the-job training for those without prior experience.

Wage Overview

For job seekers able to obtain the required education, Business and Finance occupations offer lucrative opportunities. The top posted occupation, Personal Service Managers, All Other; Entertainment and Recreation Managers, Except Gambling; and Managers, All Other, offers median hourly wages of \$57.24 (\$108,160 annually), while Sales Managers have a median hourly wage of \$71.60 (\$147,680 annually). Additional experience may lead to a role as a Marketing or Financial Manager, with median hourly wages at \$69.06 (\$143,520 annually). Human Resources Specialists provided the lowest median hourly wage for the top posted jobs in this occupation group at \$29.82, which is still significantly above the state median of \$18.60.

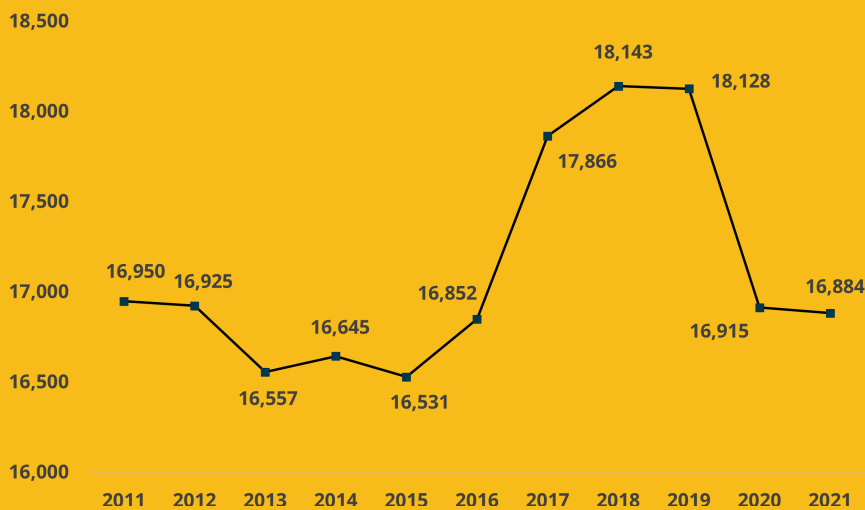

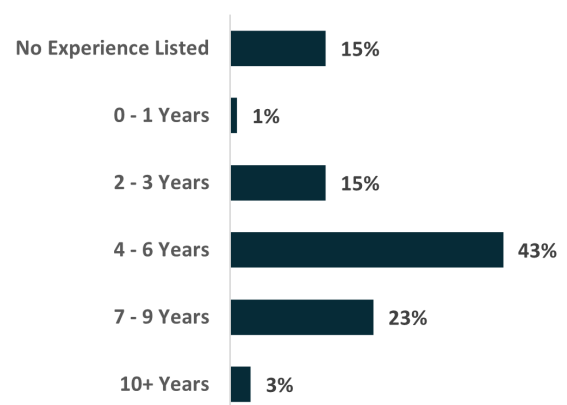
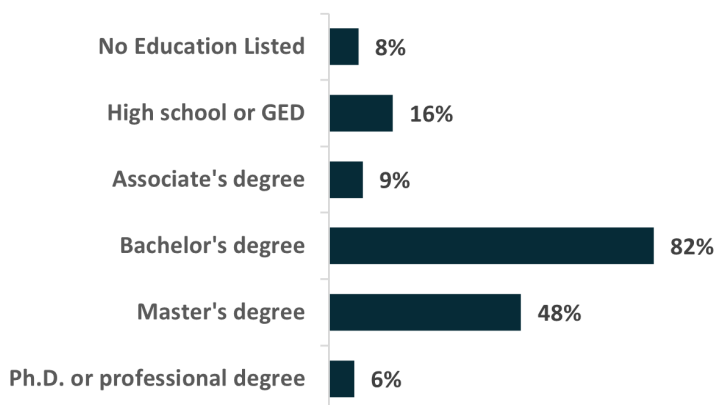

Energy Education and Experience

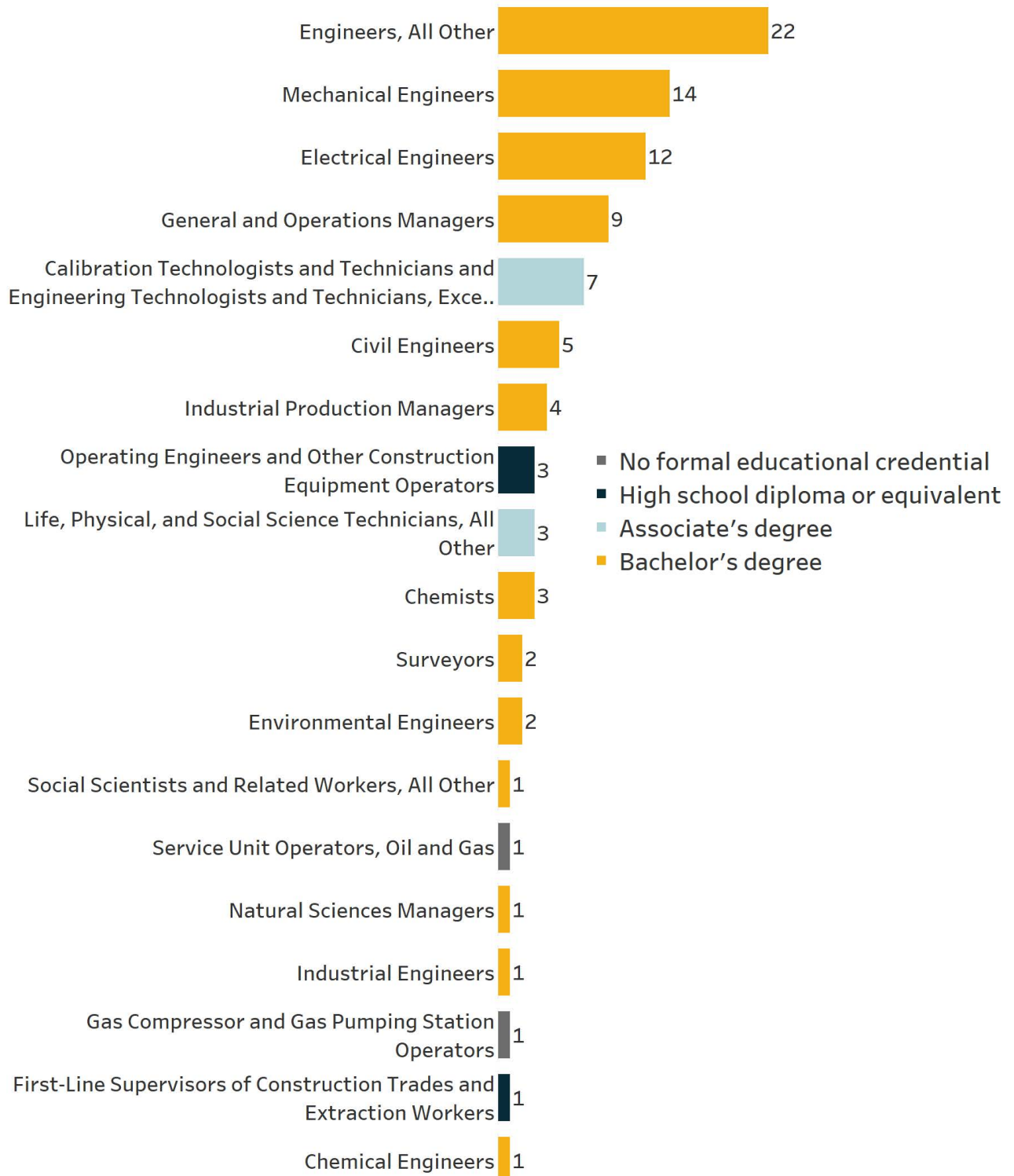
The Energy occupation group requires a specialized workforce with specific skills. A bachelor's degree is the most in-demand education level in Q4 with 82 percent of 76 postings. A master's degree is the second most in-demand education level with 48 percent, while 6 percent require a Ph.D. The amount of experience required varies widely from none to over ten years, with six years being the most commonly posted.

Most high-demand Energy occupations are engineering positions requiring a bachelor's degree. Engineers, All Other has emerged as the highest in-demand Energy occupation in Q4 with 22 postings. Other top posted jobs requiring a bachelor's degree include Electrical Engineers (12 postings) and Mechanical Engineers (14 postings). Service Unit Operators, Oil and Gas and Gas Compressor and Gas Pumping Station workers are required to hold a high school diploma or equivalent and may receive moderate to long-term on-the-job training in lieu of previous experience.



ENERGY OCCUPATION GROUP

Wage Overview

High demand for engineers and managers in the energy field provides lucrative opportunities for job seekers able to obtain the required educational level. The top posted energy job, Engineers All Other, offers a median hourly wage of \$42.30 (\$87,984 annually). Construction- and technician-focused positions generally have shorter educational requirements and pay higher median wages than similar occupations in other industries.

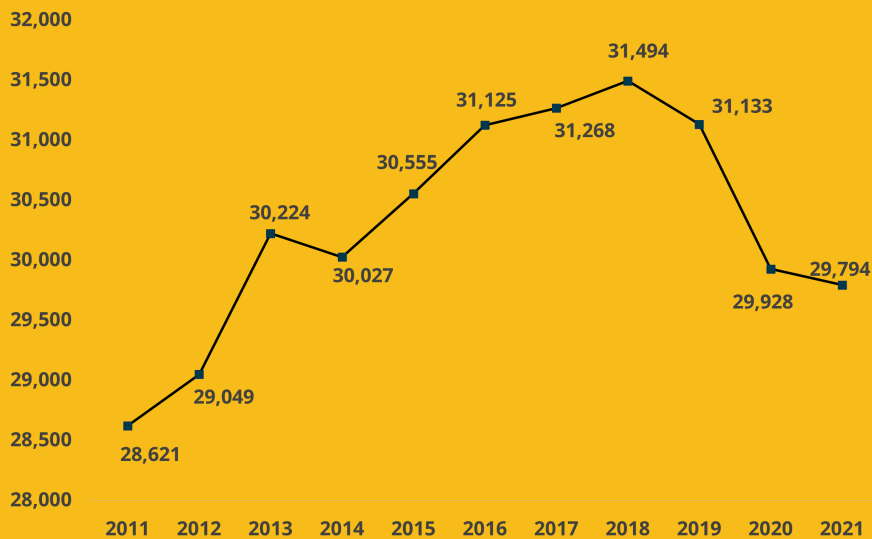

HEALTHCARE OCCUPATION GROUP

The Healthcare occupation group includes jobs related to health care support and practitioners. Employment in this group has been increasing consistently, with more healthcare workers needed to care for Michigan's aging population. Annually, there are about 23,600 job openings for these positions across southeast Michigan, and this is projected to continue increasing.

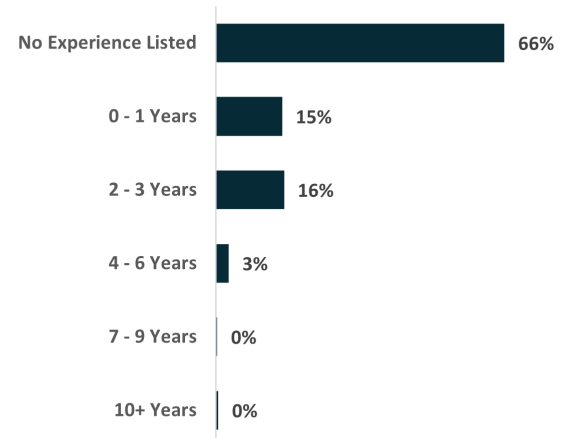
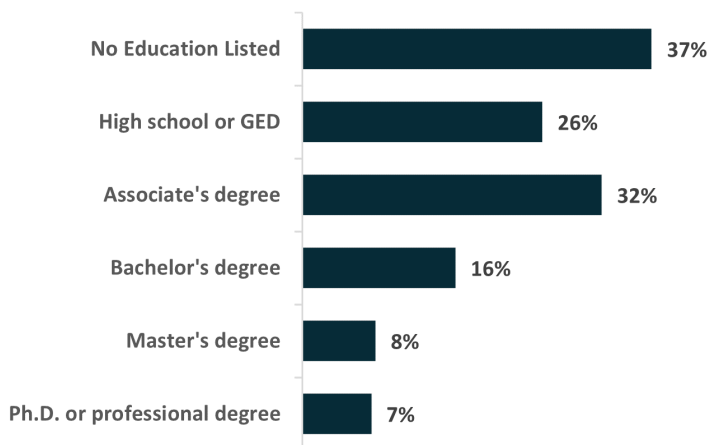

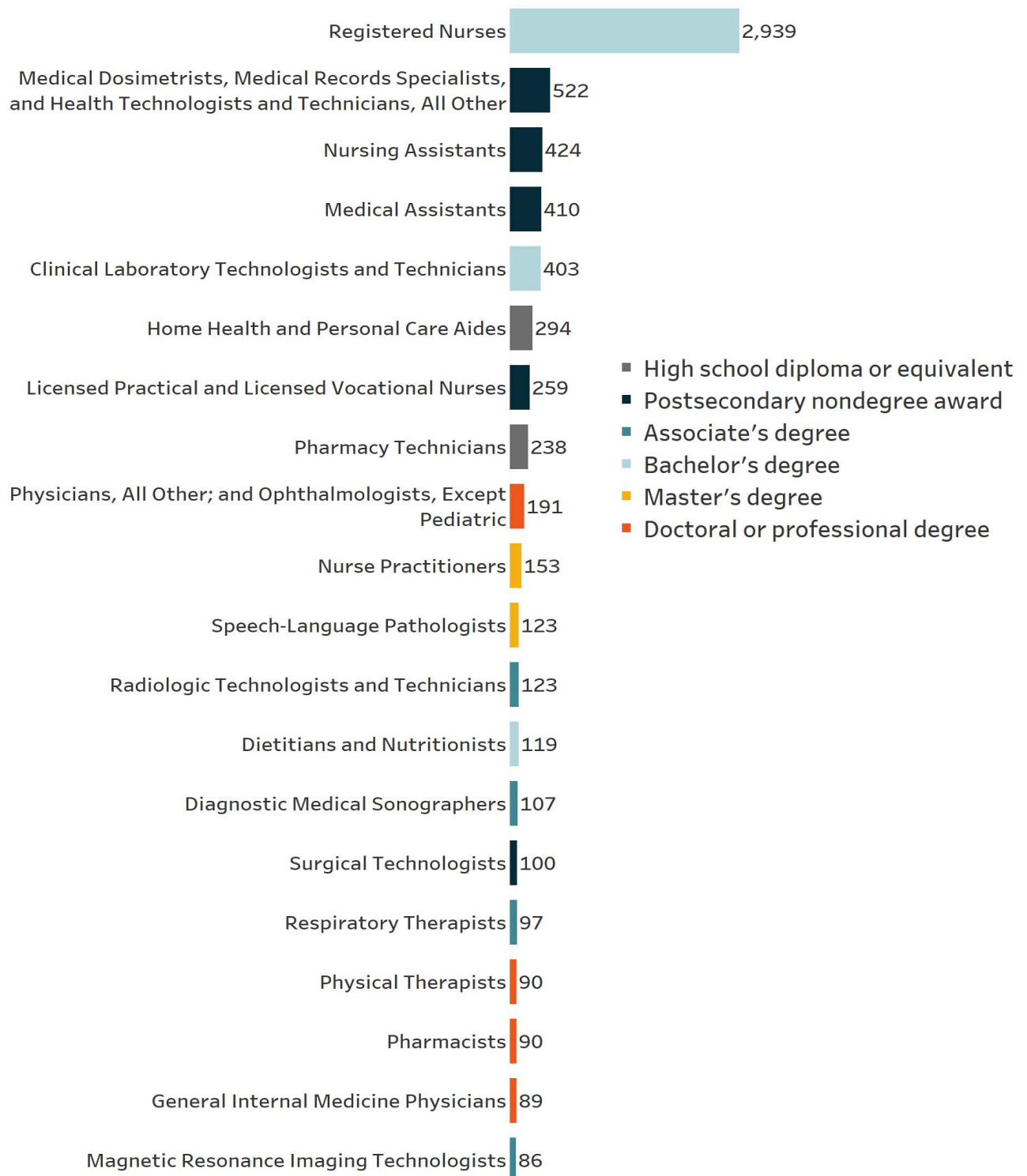
The Healthcare occupation group offers many job opportunities for active job seekers at all experience levels. An associate degree is the most in-demand education level in Q4, with 2,546 postings. A high school diploma or equivalent is the second most in-demand education level (2,041 postings). Many postings from this group were open to entry-level workers with zero to one year of experience, and do not specify any education level.



HEALTHCARE OCCUPATION GROUP

Top Posted Jobs

Registered Nurses were the highest in-demand Healthcare occupation with 2,939 total postings, a number significantly higher than all of the other occupations. An associate degree is the most in-demand education level amongst health care occupations, indicated in 32 percent of postings. A high school diploma or equivalent accounts for 26 percent of posting requirements.

Wage Overview

Wages in Healthcare are generally higher than the state median hourly wage of \$18.60, with pay increasing in line with required education, training, and experience for Healthcare's top jobs. Registered Nurses, the top posted healthcare job in Q4, offers a median hourly wage of \$37.16 (\$77,292 annually). Although many positions require an associate degree or higher, there are several jobs above the state minimum wage open to those with a high school diploma or equivalent.

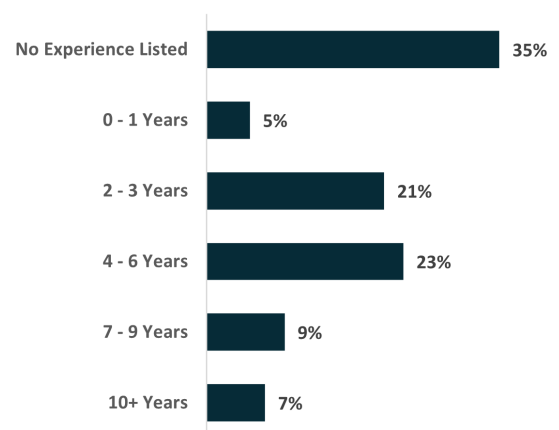

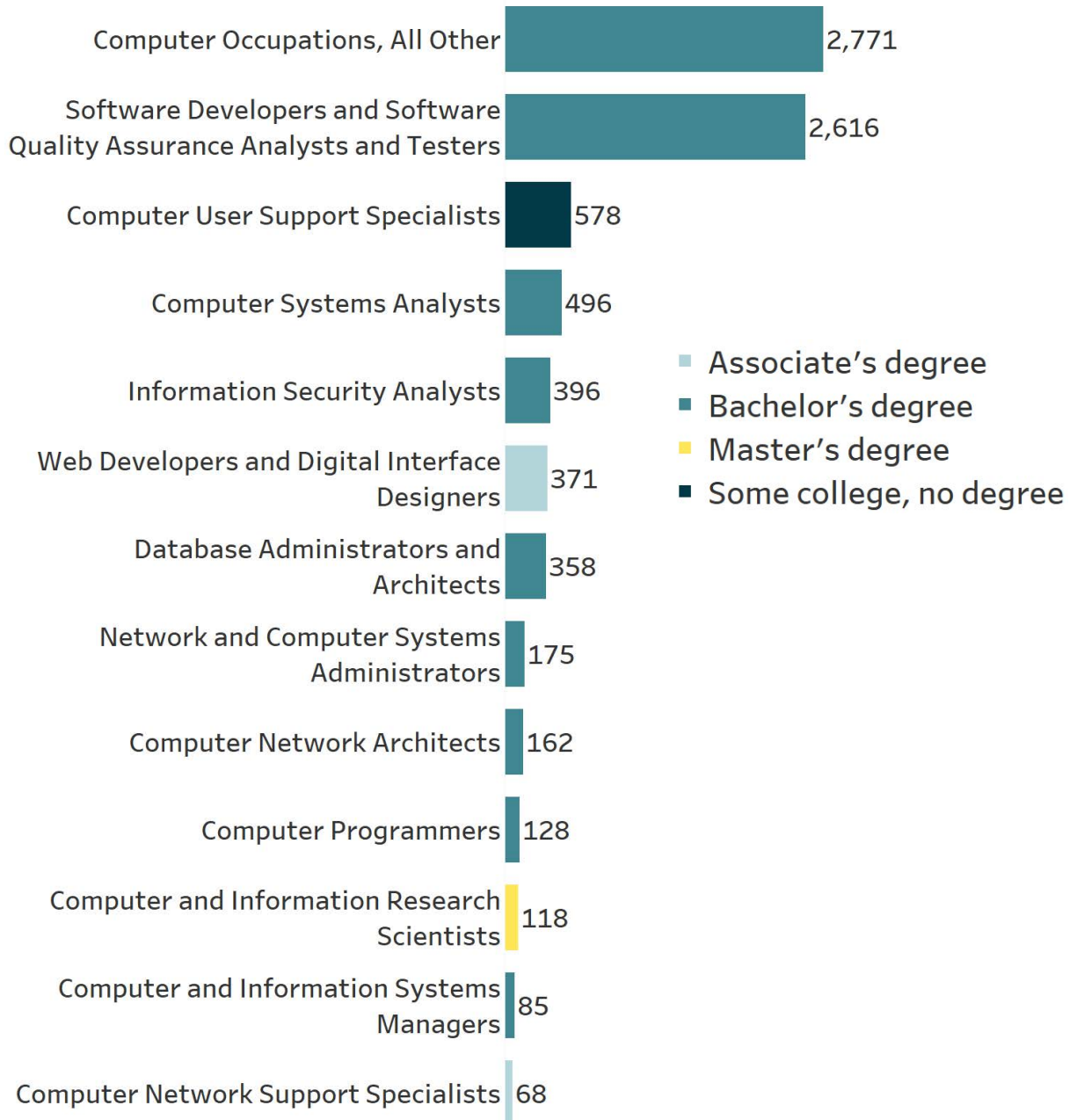

While most of the top jobs require a bachelor's degree, Web Developers and Digital Interface Designers (371 postings) typically require an associate degree while Computer User Support Specialists (578 postings) prefer some college education, but do not require a degree.

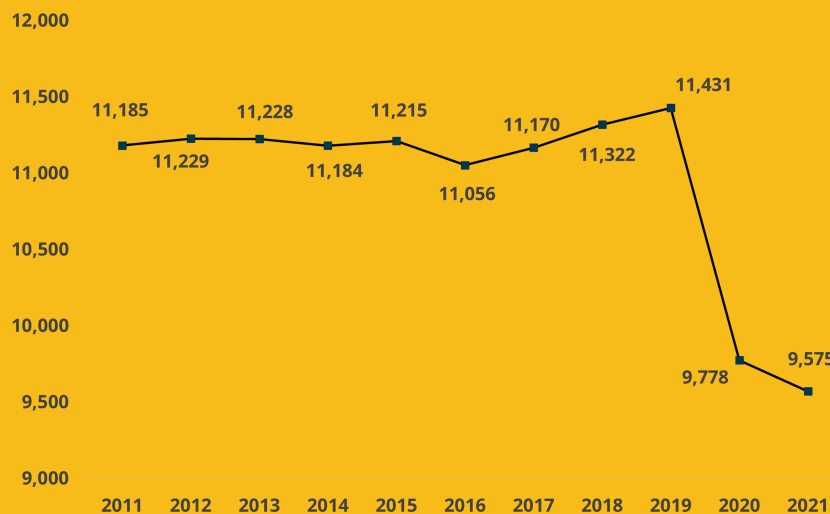

NOTE: Skilled trades related to construction and assembly are not included in this cluster, as the focus is on advanced manufacturing only.

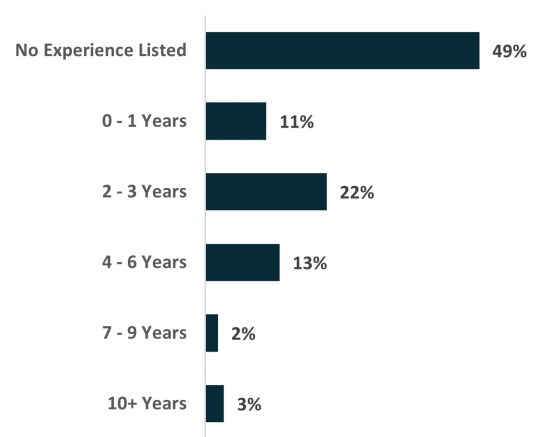
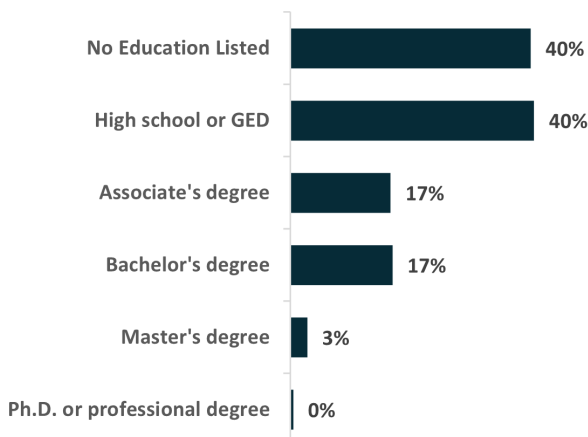

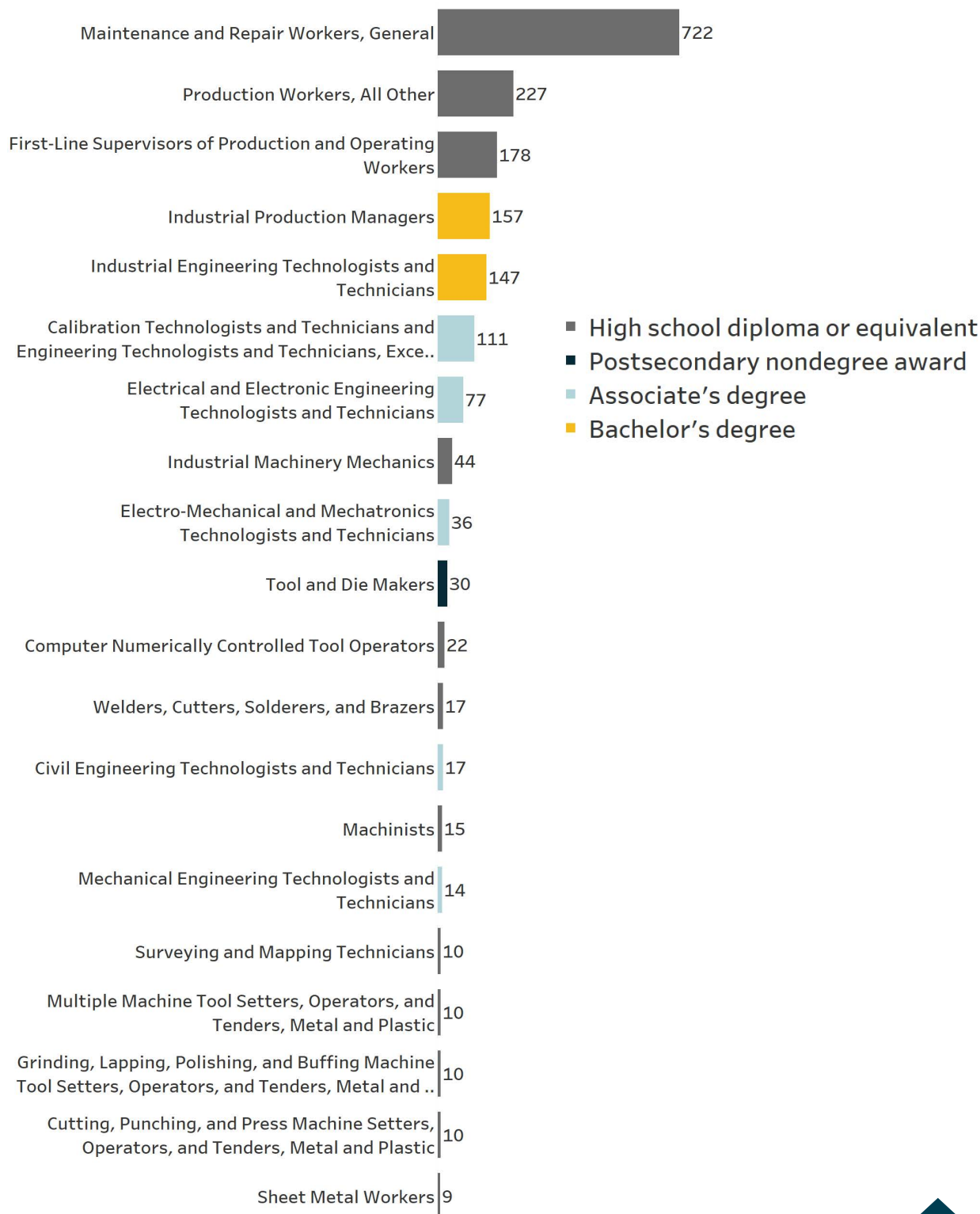
